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Special Needs–Special Person

Patsy Hannam loved being outdoors. She was independent, a skilled athlete– particularly in the curling rink–and an active member of Horizon Achievement Centre. Patsy worked in catering at Horizon Achievement Centre, as well as a cleaner at the YMCA, a job at which she excelled. Patsy had special needs, and her cousin Edna Weatherbee explains that her family was very appreciative of the care Patsy received through the Palliative Care Service, supported by the Hospice Palliative Care Society of Cape Breton County. Patsy passed away in August of 2020. Edna says the healthcare staff working within the Service treated Patsy with respect and compassion. "They would speak directly to her, and they would really listen" says Edna. "They just knew how to ask the right questions and the access to care was so easy." Edna was particularly impressed with just how quickly answers or help would come after making a phone call. "We never had to wait, as soon as we would make a call, someone would get back to us within 24 hours." Edna says their experience was extremely positive as they took the journey with Patsy.

Palliative Care Service Update

There have been many evolutions in the Service over the years. The most recent are the operational opening of Hospice Cape Breton and the expansion of our admission criteria for the An Cala Palliative Care Pain and Symptom Management Inpatient Unit at Cape Breton Regional Hospital. Our goal has always been to support those facing life limiting illness, and their families, to live their best quality of life and to also support a dignified end-of-life.

The ongoing and long-standing partnership between Nova Scotia Health's Palliative Care Service and the Hospice Palliative Care Society of Cape Breton County remains integral to providing quality hospice and palliative care to our patients and families. Providing specialized care in a patient's setting of choice is what drives our evolution and shared dedication.

Referrals to the Service from Jan 1, 2022 to July 25, 2022 stand at 629. There have been 194 patient deaths in the same period in the An Cala Unit, 121 taking place at home and 22 taking place at Hospice Cape Breton. The need to support patients and families continues to grow and the Service and Society will continue to meet every medical and personal need with compassion and care.
